### **Spring Staffing Process**

The Spring Staffing Process is once again upon us. The Joint Staffing Committee will be meeting soon to have preliminary talks on enrollment, special education staffing, and central coordinator roles. The Ford Government has not yet released their Core Education Funding (formerly known as Grants for Student Needs (GSN)). This may

create a delay in the staffing process timelines (posted on the etfohp.on.ca website). Currently, Surplus (to schools) and, if necessary, Redundancy (to the system) will be communicated on May 6. Teachers anticipated assignments will be communicated to teachers prior to Day One of the Spring Staffing Process which is May 12. This is the same date that the Board will communicate to the system anticipated administrator placements. All Phase One, Two, and Mobility placements will be decided by the members of the Expanded Joint Staffing Committee (eJSC) with equal Board and Union representation. The members of the ETFO eJSC are Sarah MacKay, Jason Surgent, Jane Scanlan-Price, Justine Bucknell, and Danielle Saunders. If you are interested in a move, you might also want to investigate the possibility of a Teacher Exchange. If teachers who are declared Surplus (to their school), or Redundant (to the system) have questions about the process, please speak to your steward or call the Local Office. In the event that the Board declares Redundancy with the potential for a recall list, the Local Office will be in touch with those teachers regarding setting up a common meeting to explain the process and answer questions.

### **Local Annual Meeting**

Our Local Annual Meeting will be held on Tuesday, April 29<sup>th</sup> at 5:00 p.m. at The Grand in Belleville with a satellite site at York River in Bancroft. This is an election year for Committee Chairs and the position of Secretary. At the Local Annual Meeting, a draft Budget will be presented for members approval and new Constitution amendments will be brought forward.

At the Annual Meeting in Toronto in August of 2024, AMR#32 from R. ST-JAMES (Limestone Teacher Local)/T. BARKER (Upper Grand Teacher Local) was passed:

"That a local with two (2) or more released officers and no constitutional provisions to ensure that at least one (1) released officer self-identify as a woman:

- i) at their next local general meeting that considers constitutional amendments, put forward an amendment to ensure that at least one (1) released officer self identify as a woman; and
- ii) have members vote on this issue"

As a result, the Local is bringing forward a motion to address the provincial motion locally:

**Article VII:** If the budget determines that there can be more than 2 Released Executive Members (REM) the Local shall have a President, a Vice President Woman and a Vice President Open beginning with the elections for the 2026-28 term.

Please try to find time in your schedule in order to attend.

Our Celebration Dinner, at which we honour new, 25-year, and retiring teachers will be held on Tuesday, June 10<sup>th</sup>. New teachers in attendance will receive their wooden apple and the 25-year teachers in attendance will receive their red glass apple. ### **Provincial Annual Meeting**

ETFO's Annual Meeting will take place in Toronto from August 11-14, 2025. This year is a Provincial Executive election year so we are looking forward to an eventful Annual Meeting!

### **Federal Election**

On March 23, 2025, Her Excellency the Governor General, at the recommendation of the Prime Minister, issued a proclamation to dissolve the 44<sup>th</sup> Parliament. The 45<sup>th</sup> General Election will be held on **Monday, April 28, 2025**.





- ETFO's Multi-Year Strategy to Address Violence in Schools, including data about ETFO members' experiences
- Some of the myths our members hear about violence in schools and their rights, and where those myths come from
- A walk through a day at school, including the protections and processes that should be in place:
  - Notifications of risk Risk assessments
  - Safety plans
- Work refusals
- · How to report violent incidents
- · How and when the risk of violence should be reassessed
- Where ETFO members can find the information they need and find support
- What members can do if you they are experiencing violence at school



After experiencing violence, submitting a report may be the last thing on your mind. Reporting violent incidents is your legal responsibility and it's an important part of creating solutions to address violence in the schools.

- 1. The documentation of a serious student incident is important when advocating for more
- 2. Making a report supports your colleagues. If you do not report violence, others are less likely to be informed of the risk.
- 3. Reports are for your protection and your wellbeing. A report creates a record of what happened. If you experience illness or injury now or later, the report is your record to demonstrate that it is a workplace injury. This is true whether the impact of violence is physical or psychological.

Don't forget, your report is also included in the reports that are given to the Joint Health and Safety Committee. This committee meets at the board level and will look at issues to identify systemic solutions to violence in our schools. You are required to report violent incidents that cause or could cause physical injury, whether physical force is actual, attempted or threatened.

### Your duty to REPORT

You have a duty to report violent incidents regardless of a person's age, needs or other mitigating factors.

- Submit a workplace violence report.
- Submit an injury/illness report with or without first aid or medical attention.
- If the incident is a serious student incident, submit a Safe Schools Incident report.

These reports should be made through your school board's online incident reporting too You have the right to refuse work if you believe

workplace violence is likely to endanger you. Teachers must take into account the safety of

their students before refusing work. If you have questions, are blocked from reporting in

any way, or are considering refusing work, call your ETFO local for support or the provincial office at: 416-962-3836 or 1-888-838-3836.
