LTD



Chair: Stephanie Donaldson, Tyendinaga


It is not fun working in an overheated classroom. Staff with pre-existing health conditions and those who are pregnant are more vulnerable to symptoms of heat stress. Report health and safety concerns about high temperature and humidity to your principal. Put your concern in writing. Request that these concerns be investigated and dealt with. Drink lots of water during the day. Take time to rest in a cool place on your breaks. If possible, schedule some classroom time in an air conditioned space. Avoid physical exertion. If you are feeling symptoms of a heat-related illness, report it to your principal and through CLEVR using the injury/accident reporting online form.



Working INDOORS in HOT/ HUMID Conditions







RECOMMENDED ACTIONS / PROVISIONS HUMIDEX RISK

45+ **EXTREME** Only medically supervised work should contine

Humidex exposures above 45, heat stress should be managed as per the ACGIH TLV®

SEVERE

Work with 45 minutes relief per hour can continue – in addition to the provisions listed below

SIGNIFICANT

38-39 **MODERATE** Work with 15 minutes relief per hour can continue:

Provide adequate cool (10-15°C) water

Drink at least 1 cup (240 mL) of water every 20 minutes

Note: Worker(s) with symptoms should seek medical attention

34-37 MORE

- Post Heat Stress Warning notice
- Notify workers that they need to drink extra water
- Ensure workers are trained to recognize symptoms

30-33 SOME

- · Post heat stress alert notice
- Encourage workers to drink extra water
- · Record hourly temperature and relative humidity

25-29 NONE

OHCOW

Supply water to workers on an "as needed" basis

Never ignore anyone's symptoms – despite what the measurements indicate


