
MAKING LIVES BETTER!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:



September Enrolment Imbalances

The Joint Staffing Committee has met and made recommendations for school reorganizations. As always, decision-making is guided by several provisions in the Collective Agreement (school staffing averages and Grade 4-8 system-wide averages), as well as Ministry Regulations (a Kindergarten cap, primary class size caps, etc.), with

some flexibility for school-based decisions which can be achieved within the CA and Ministry requirements. The overall enrolment did increase this year. The changes in school-based enrolment have caused some movement within school and between schools in the system. All moves/reorganizations are to be completed by/occur on October 7th. The good news is that all but 3 members have been recalled fully from the Redundancy list. There were three new French teachers hired and there will be some part time contract teachers hired as well.

Joint Staffing Committee Timetable Survey

Each fall, timetables are collected by the Joint Staffing Committee for review. Although this is often referred to as the "ETFO timetables", it is for the entire Joint Staffing Committee and not just ETFO. Although timetables are to

be collected by the final school day in September, the Joint Staffing Committee did mutually extend this timeline due to school reorganizations. This year, the JSC will be collecting surveys and timetables electronically using a Google Form; you can use your Board email for this as the information is being collected by the JSC. If you have any questions or difficulties with filling out the survey or attaching your timetable, please contact Jason Surgent at <code>jsurgent@etfohp.on.ca</code>. We appreciate your efforts in filling out the Timetable Survey and in submitting your timetables!

Safe Schools Incident Reporting:

Far too often we are made aware of concerning student behaviours within your classrooms and schools. It is important, and mandatory, that Safe Schools Student Incident Report are completed. If you have observed or become aware of a student "behaving in a way that is likely to have a negative impact on the school climate", a response is required of you. The behaviour should be reported to the principal as soon as possible.

You are asked to complete the Safe Schools Student Incident Reporting Form – Part 1 on every occasion when a report is made to the principal regarding student misconduct which can lead to a suspension or expulsion. Wherever possible, it is expected that the teacher will provide an oral report to the principal at the earliest, safe opportunity. The written report (Form 378-15) must be completed and submitted online to the principal/vice-principal or teacher-in-charge when it is safe to do so and no later than the end of the school day. Once you have completed the Safe Schools Incident Report on Clevr, send an email to your principal letting them know you have submitted a form.

Form 378-15 provides a list of activities for which suspension/ expulsion must be considered. If you are being told not to complete the Safe Schools Incident Form or have any questions regarding the Safe School Incident Forms, please reach out to 1st Vice-President, Jason Surgent at jsurgent@etfohp.on.ca.



Collaborating to Support Teaching in St. Kitts and Nevis



Last July, I traveled to the two-island country of St. Kitts and Nevis in the Caribbean Sea with *Teaching Together*, representing the Hastings Prince Edward Teachers' Local. The trip was both challenging and rewarding. Alongside my partner and team lead, Stephanie Deagle from the Nova Scotia Teachers Union, and three local teachers from St. Kitts, we worked closely with the St. Kitts Teachers' Union to deliver daily sessions for 65 Teaching Assistants at the Vocational Education Centre in Basseterre. Each day, participants and facilitators were welcomed with delicious local delicacies prepared by students at the Centre, adding warmth and hospitality to the learning environment. Workshops focused on Classroom Management, Instructional Strategies, Child-Centered Pedagogy, and Inclusive Education, immersing participants in interactive, practical techniques to enhance student engagement, academic growth, and positive learning environments.

Teaching Together (formerly Project Overseas) is a joint initiative of the Canadian Teachers' Federation (CTF/FCE), its provincial and territorial member organizations, and partner organizations in developing countries. Since 1962, the program has strengthened teaching and learning in over 50 countries by combining local knowledge with global best practices. This initiative was a true collaboration between the St. Kitts Teachers'

Union, the St. Kitts and Nevis Ministry of Education, and the CTF, giving Stephanie, myself, and the local St. Kitts teachers the chance to share knowledge, learn from participants, and support one another. It was a powerful reminder of the difference educators can make when communities, unions, and global partners come together to advance inclusive, transformative education.

"College full-time support workers are standing up like never before. And we know our communities will stand with us, because this fight is also about access to local, public education in our backyards," said JP Hornick, President of OPSEU/SEFPO. "Support staff aren't alone – they have the support of the 200,000 public sector workers we represent and thousands of labour and community allies who are ready to fight shoulder to shoulder for a public college system we can be proud of."

OPSEU Provincial President JP Hornick was at Loyalist on September 3 for the Save Our Colleges Rally along with the support of students, labour and the community members. Sarah, Jason and Jane were proud to be there standing in solidarity to support our local college workers and students.

As of 12:01 a.m. on September 11th, more than 10,000 full-time college support staff, represented by OPSEU/SEFPO, are on strike across Ontario's 24 public colleges. Released Officers Jason and Jane were joined by our OSSTF and CUPE colleagues in picketing in solidarity with our OPSEU siblings.

Earlier this week, OPSEU/SEFPO released a <u>new report</u> on Ford's <u>controversial Skills Development Fund</u> (SDF), <u>now under investigation by the Auditor General</u>. The union contends that the SDF is a \$2.5 billion "black box" without financial oversight that is being used to subsidize a privatized career training system. Meanwhile, public colleges that serve local communities have been defunded in real time.

(nee Scaletta) -


