PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:



All-Member Workplace Violence Survey

Thank you for taking the time to complete the provincial ETFO Workplace Violence Survey last fall. There was a good response from the this Local, and we will be provided with the Local results soon. You

have probably seen the provincial press release and the article in the *Intelligencer*, which provides some details on the pervasiveness of violence in our classrooms, the lack of front-line resources, and the increasing frequency of incidents. Seventy per cent of ETFO members have experienced violence or have witnessed violence in their schools. Teachers report that both the number and the severity of the incidents is increasing. Over two-thirds of our members have reported the incidents, yet only 50% of them have been followed up by administration. Of those follow ups, over half are rated as ineffective, and only 3% as very effective. Of those who did not report the incidents, approximately 35% did not know how to report or didn't think they had to, and over 20% were either fearful of repercussions or were told not to.

These are all very alarming statistics. In our school visits, Pierre, Sarah, and I have been emphasizing the duty to report all violent incidents under **Board Procedure 421** and all Safe Schools incidents under **Board Procedure 378**. These procedures are based on legislation which make it **mandatory to report.** It isn't an option. By not reporting, teachers are putting themselves at risk. In many schools, there is confusion over the difference between 421-1, 378-13, and in-school office referral forms. Office referral forms may be used in some circumstances, but they do not replace the necessity to report using one or both of the official Board forms. **If you feel pressured to not report Violent Incidents and Safe Schools Incidents, or if there are conflicting messages around reporting in your school, please call the Local Office and we will follow up.**

ETFO Town Hall Meetings

Continuing the practice begun last year, the Local will once again be holding regional town halls for ETFO members. Members may attend any or all of these meetings if they choose (dates and locations on the front page of the newsletter). The staffing process will be discussed in detail, with a particular focus in the Trenton, Belleville, Madoc and Picton meetings on the implications of **K-12 and 7-12 schools.** These meetings are also to update members on **Collective Bargaining** issues. As we approach the final year of the contract extension, it is important to begin discussing issues related to the next round of contract bargaining. Please try to make time in your schedules to attend at least one of the town halls.

School Budget Committees

Article 18 of the Collective Agreement requires each school to have a budget committee consisting of the principal and at least three ETFO members. The committee is to have "access to all school level financial information and will make recommendations to the principal with respect to funding allocations, short and long term priorities and any other fiscal matters affecting the operations of the school." As we are now at the half way point in the school year, it is worth noting that the School Budget Committee must meet at least three times per year. It is particularly important in these times of budget cuts and fiscal restraint that ETFO members participate in and understand the school budget process. If your school does not have a budget committee in place, or if you are unsure, please speak to your School Steward, and contact the Local Office.

School Violence Up

BELLEVILLE - The Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (ETFO) is sounding the alarm about rising violence in schools.

According to a survey conducted on behalf of the teachers' union, 70 per cent of ETFO members have personally experienced violence or witnessed

violence against another staff person. Nearly eight in 10 members say the number of violent incidents have increased, with 75 per cent of all members saying the severity of violent incidents has increased.

For members who experienced violence, 83 per cent reported the violence was perpetrated by a student.

While local numbers are still to be released, Dave
Henderson, president of Hastings-Prince Edward Local
ETFO, said he expects they'll be pretty close to the provincial results.

"I didn't find anything in it surprising, really. I hear those kinds of stories every day," said Henderson, who has been visiting ETFO members at schools in the region as part of an ongoing information campaign about school violence.

"We hear a lot about violence in the classroom and the problems around reporting it," he continued. "Based on the reaction of our members we figure that it is under reported."

Henderson has heard stories from teachers who have been kicked, punched, spit on and even had items like chairs and books thrown at them.

He said a large part of the issue stems from the *Ministry of Education* itself, citing a funding formula which doesn't address special needs — leading to a "tremendous" shortage of front-line resources like educational assistants (EAs), social workers and child and youth care workers.

"Those (EAs) are the people that are needed in classes in order to assist teachers in dealing with these kind of issues and they're just not there. They're spread too thin and the numbers are cut back every year and so our teachers are dealing with these situations and they're just not equipped for dealing with them.

"So you end up with situations where you just have to evacuate the classroom, and that's not satisfactory. That's interfering with everybody's learning environment."

More than a third of ETFO members surveyed said they had been involved in a classroom evacuation during the 2016-2017 school year.

"Most of those evacuations are in the primary grades, which is maybe something that people don't realize, that a lot of the increase in violence and evacuations is occurring with the youngest children."



Festive Art Workshop


